2. ADDITIONS/DELETIONS TO THE AGENDA/EMERGENCY ITEMS:

A. Robert C. Adair, Jr, Chairman called a meeting of all supervisors - All five supervisors of the governing body of each district shall meet at least once per calendar year in a public meeting pursuant to F.S. 286.011. The Board agreed to hold an official Public Board Meeting on Tuesday, November 28, 2023 @ 11:00 AM.

<u>3.</u> APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

A. The Minutes for Board Meeting of October 2, 2023 were approved as written.

Motion: A Motion to approve the October 2, 2023 Minutes was made by George F. Hamner, Jr. and Seconded by Christine Kelly-Begazo. Motion carried unanimously.

4. FINANCIAL REPORT:

A. The Financial Report for October 2023 was available and read by Robert C. Adair, Jr.

Motion: A motion to accept the October 2023 financial report as presented was made by Christine Kelly-Begazo and Seconded by Charles Kennon Hendrix. Motion carried unanimously.

- A. Jennifer Abbey, United States Department of Agriculture-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) Report:
 - News: Urban and Innovative Producers, Public Invited to Attend November Meeting of Federal Advisory Committee for Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production The virtual meeting will run from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Eastern on Nov. 29, 2023. To attend virtually, register by Nov. 29, 2023, on the Committee's webpage. usda.gov/urban

Florida NRCS offers \$15.5 million through Conservation Stewardship Program. Virtual workshop Nov 6 (recorded). Deadline to apply for program November 17 **Recent Florida Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) projects will receive over \$40.2 million in funding**. In Florida, two projects were approved for funding:

Lake to Lagoon RCPP – Funded at \$25 million, this project led by Alachua Conservation Trust will accelerate land protection and land management to protect environmentally sensitive and working lands and benefit regional climate mitigation in the low-lying region of East Central Florida, which is bound by large lakes and rivers on the west boundary, and Mosquito and Indian River Lagoons along the Atlantic Coast.

Corridor to Coast (C2C) – Led by North Florida Land Trust, this project was funded at over \$15.2 million to protect and improve ecological conditions of the C2C Corridor all the way out to the East Coast. This includes protection of natural areas, wildlife habitat, and regional water quality as compatible with working lands and the natural resource-based economy of the area.

- B. Andrea Lazzari, Indian River County (IRC) Agricultural Extension Director/ University of Florida/Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF IFAS) Report:
 No Report.
- C. Matthew Cox, Environmental Specialist III, Office of Agricultural Water Policy- Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (OAWP-FDACS) Report:

 Continuing with Implementation Verifications (IV's) with agricultural producers.

Lex Kromhout asked if whether the County had to follow the Best Management Practices (BMP's) as do the agricultural land owners that are within the BMAP enrollment Maps. He further asked, "Who is the County regulated by" and if it is Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and if so "are the regulation requirements equivalent to BMP's requirements that the agricultural land owners have to follow?"

Robert C. Adair, Jr. Chairman of IRSWCD stated it would be very helpful to our Board if we were to have a somebody from the Utilities Department to attend our meetings. Whether Sean Lieske wants to attend or send someone else from the Utilities Department to help field questions from the public and the board would be greatly appreciated.

Eric Charest, Interim Natural Resources Director stated that the Indian River County's compliance with the BMAP requirements is far beyond just the Utilities Department. If you are seeing yard debris or grass debris spread into the road ways. That is against County ordinances. There are many departments within the County that are involved in compliance with the BMAP. Watering depends on where the irrigation is applied as well as the water source; whether it is re-use water. If the area is within the City of Vero Beach limits or the

unincorporated area of the County. If there is an abuse of watering, the County has to apply the same standards as everyone else does.

Lex Kromhout, I don't know if it is the County; it looks like the County is doing landscaping maintenance in the area between 43rd Street and I-95 on State Road 60 and has seen irrigation going at the craziest times.

Eric Charest stated that is on established sod. You have 30-90 days to water in new sod. But the area you are mentioning is an established grass area. There are many entities within the County that are involved with regard to BMAP's. Can not speak for Utilities Department, but can speak for Stormwater side of things.

Robert C. Adair, Jr. Chairman of IRSWCD asked Eric Charest to provide the Board with a presentation for the December 11, 2023 meeting featuring Indian River County Stormwater efforts and compliance with BMAP's and a look at the milestones. Also, reiterated that the IRSWCD Board would like a liaison from the Indian River Utilities Department to attend our meetings.

 \$115,041.26 for 2023-2024; Paid out a total of \$55,193.32: \$32,504.98 from prior year and \$22,688.34 current FY 2023-2024. 4 Cost-Share Agreements pending receipt of RFR's totaling \$48,155.64. Balance available of \$21,783.57 for FY 2024 Cost-Share FY 2023-2024.

- ★ <u>AFCD</u>: contracted with Stream Line technology websites for special districts. AFCD does pay Stream Line \$960 annual or \$1,080 individual for creation of website. Then once completed it is up to the District to handle all the website content and keep up to date. Transition is not going very well from what I have seen.

Robert C. Adair, Jr. spoke to Raulie Raulerson about the Audit expense and FDACS will only reimburse a maximum of \$5,000.00, leaving the District to pay the balance of \$3,000.00. The administrative fee amount that the District receives from FDACS for the distribution of Cost-Share funding does not cover the Audit expense. Raulie is to provide to Robert C.

Adair, Jr., the names of other Accounting firms that other SWCD's use in the State of Florida that are less costly.

The District will competitively look outside their firm and to bring the cost down to the \$5,000.00 range and seconded by Christine Kelly-Begazo. Motion carried unanimously.
